	<i>Key Messages:</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Stress the importance of incorporating private sector input into the APEC process – public-private cooperation is a benefit, not a hindrance to reporting.• Identify cases of anti-corruption reporting by APEC economies (such as the UNCAC mechanism) that can be used to assist APEC reporting.
