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ABAC Urges Vigilance on Protectionism

The APEC Business Advisory Council held its second meeting of 2009 in Brunei Darussalam from May 12 - 15. Under the leadership of Singapore, the Council advanced work on deliverables and recommendations for APEC Leaders in November and approved two communiqués, a letter to APEC Leaders with recommendations for immediate action on the global economic crisis and a letter to APEC Ministers Responsible for Trade which highlighted a broader set of recommendations for APEC. Both of the letters reflected a strong desire by the business community to see APEC Leaders stand by the APEC

and G20 commitments to refrain from implementing new barriers to trade in response to the crisis. ABAC also advanced its efforts to develop a mechanism to monitor these commitments.

After some discussion, the Council determined that it could best add value to APEC by highlighting the findings of ex-

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APEC Trade Ministers to Meet in Singapore

APEC Trade Ministers will conduct their annual meeting 21-22 July in Singapore. Among the many subjects likely to dominate the discussion will be the role of APEC in resisting protectionism and restoring growth through creation of an environment that enables business and trade. In its role as co-chair of the U.S. APEC Business Coalition, the National Center is working with its partners to arrange a series of events on the margins of the MRT for business delegates to interact with the Ministers and staffs gathering in Singapore for these meetings.

Both Ministers and business agree on the need to continue to encourage direct dialogue between businesses and policy makers to ensure APEC work priorities remain informed by, and relevant to, the real needs of the companies and individuals who will drive a return to growth by doing business in the region.

To facilitate this, the Ministers have agreed to participate in a Business Luncheon at noon on July 22nd. This event, cohosted by the U.S. APEC Business Coalition and the Singapore Business Federation, will bring top business leaders from around the region together with the APEC Trade Ministers for a discussion on key issues of the day. Topics for discussion will include the strategic value and relevance of APEC, regional economic integration efforts through 2011, and how APEC can stay connected to business priorities. A special panel including USTR Ambassador Ron Kirk, Singapore Minister for Trade and Industry Lim Hng Kiang, and Japanese Minister of Economy, Trade and Industy Toshihiro Nikai, will provide comments on these topics and take questions from the

business guests. Other APEC Trade Ministers will also attend the event and join the business delegates for discussion.

Later that evening at 5 pm, USTR Kirk will meet separately with U.S. business representatives to discuss U.S. trade priorities in APEC, and to take further questions and input from the U.S. business community. This will be Ambassador Kirk's first major APEC event, and he is

expected to offer an initial perspective on how APEC will fit into overall U.S. trade priorities, and what objectives will be prioritized in the years leading up to 2011.

isting monitoring exercises being undertaken by the World Bank and World Trade Organization, instead of duplicating these efforts.

The ABAC USA team, led by Deb Henretta (P&G), Peter Scher (JPMorgan Chase) and Nick Reilly (General Motors) made progress on a number of issues identified by NCAPEC members as priorities for 2009 and beyond. ABAC USA members also met with their colleagues from Japan to discuss cooperation in ABAC leadership in 2010 and 2011 when Japan and the US will chair the ABAC, respectively.

The third ABAC meeting of the year will be held from August 24 - 27 in Da Nang, Vietnam. ABAC members will finalize the 2009 ABAC Report to Leaders and Report to Finance Ministers, and will discuss key messages for the APEC Dialogue with Leaders which will be held in Singapore on November 14.

NCAPEC Welcomes New U.S. APEC Senior Official

Members of NCAPEC's Board of Governors held an initial meeting with the new U.S. Senior Official for APEC, Kurt Tong, at the offices of Procter & Gamble on Tuesday, July 7th. The meeting was conceived as an opportunity for members to

express their priorities and bring Mr. Tong up to speed on key issues of concern in APEC as he transitions into his new role and



prepares for his first SOM as U.S. Senior Official in Singapore later this month.

In addition to his new role Mr. Tong at present remains Acting Deputy Assistant Secretary and Director for Korean Affairs. Previously, he served as Director for Asian Economic Affairs at the National Security Council from 2006 to 2008, and has been actively involved in APEC affairs

for many years. Prior to that, he served as Minister-Counselor for Economic Affairs at the U.S. Embassy in Seoul and was involved in the launch of Free Trade Agreement negotiations between the United States and South Korea. Before arriving in Seoul, Mr. Tong had assignments at the U.S. Embassy in Beijing from 2000 to 2003 as well as the U.S. Embassy Tokyo from 1996 to 1999.

Mr. Tong is a member of the Senior Foreign Service, and the recipient of the 2005 Herbert Salzman Award for Excellence in International Economic Performance, awarded by the Department of State for outstanding contributions in advancing United States international relations in the economic field.

Mr. Tong replaces Ambassador Pat Haslach, who departed on July 1st for a new posting as Deputy Chief of Mission at the U.S. Embassy in Iraq.

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Private Sector Organizes to Promote Food Security

In 1999 it was the business community, through the ABAC, that first proposed the creation of an APEC Food System (AFS), a mechanism for guiding efforts to promote trade in food with the ultimate goal of creating a single open market for food within APEC. In light of the dramatic spike in commodity prices in 2008 and subsequent renewed concern within APEC on the issue of food security in the region, the private sector is once again looking to play a key role in helping government develop successful, well-prioritized approaches to solving the real problems faced in this area.

In late 2008 the National Center, in conjunction with Board Member Cargill, Inc. and other organizations such as the Grocery Manufacturers Association and the U.S. Council on International Business,

NCAPEC Advances Recommendations on Customs Procedures

A group of NCAPEC Board Member companies, including Boeing, FedEx, GM and IBM, has compiled a comprehensive list of recommendations for improvements and reforms customs agencies in APEC should implement to expedite the flow of goods across borders. Many studies have shown that trade facilitation is an area where reforms have the potential to lead to significant cost reductions for businesses and consumers.



ABAC USA presented the list of recommendations at the May ABAC meeting in Brunei. These were endorsed and will be presented to APEC's Sub Committee on Customs Procedures (SCCP) at their upcoming meeting in August. A document detailing the recommendations is available from the National Center's website, www.ncapec.org.

organized a grouping of companies to develop a cohesive business position on how APEC can improve its efforts to promote regional food security, with a focus on full implementation of the AFS. The NCAPEC Food and Ag Industry Consortium produced a framework document entitled "Food Industry Objectives for APEC 2009", a series of priorities and concrete, short-term objectives APEC officials could work towards as stepping stones towards a larger, regional food solution.

In addition to this effort, within the ABAC U.S. members, in conjunction with several other ABAC delegations, have called for a review and rewrite of the AFS, with an aim to releasing an updated version of the document to Leaders in November. This will underscore businesses' continued commitment to the fundamental belief that addressing food security issues is a core requirement for promoting stable, sustainable growth regionally.

At present, both ABAC and the NCAPEC Consortium are working to collaborate on commissioning an independent study to conduct this rework of the AFS and develop further proposals to guide its implementation in APEC over the coming years, including through U.S.



hosting of APEC in 2011.

The Secretary of State has made clear that food security remains a priority issue for the U.S., and incoming U.S. Senior Official Kurt Tong has reiterated the government's commitment to welcoming private sector input and working together with business to come up with practical approaches to be pursued in the APEC context. Through its work in ABAC and with the Consortium, NCAPEC will continue to provide companies with an important opportunity to be a part of this dialogue.

APEC 2011 Sectoral Planning Sessions

From June through early July, the National Center and the APEC office of the Office of the United States Trade Representative, in collaboration with 2011 partner organizations, held a series of sectoral planning sessions to kick-off discussions about program and policy deliverables for the US hosting of APEC in 2011. To date meetings have been held on trade facilitation, services, environmental goods and services, energy security, and information and communication technology. In August, NCAPEC will schedule meetings on intellectual property rights, food security, standards, investment and health & life sciences.

The meetings have served as an excellent forum for representatives from a range of industries to meet with USG agencies to share ideas on objectives for 2011. NCAPEC will continue to work with its members, USG and partner organizations to lay the foundation for these objectives during the Japan APEC hosting in 2010.

NCAPEC Board Meets with Japanese Senior Officials

On May 13, National Center Board Members met with Japan's APEC Senior Officials Mr. Kenji Hiramatsu of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Mr. Makoto Shiota of the Ministry of Economy, Trade and Industry to discuss themes and priorities for Japan's hosting of APEC in 2010. Japan is an important partner for the US in APEC. In addition to being host of the forum during the year prior to the US hosting, US and Japanese companies share many of the same policy concerns and objectives in the Asia Pacific region.

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ABTC Legislation Introduced in Congress

The APEC Business Travel Cards Act of 2009, H.R. 3192, was introduced by Representative Rick Larsen (D-WA), co-chair of the House APEC Caucus, on Monday, July 13th. The act will authorize the Department of Homeland Security, in cooperation with the State Department, to issue ABTCs to qualified U.S. business persons who routinely travel to APEC economies for business purposes. NCAPEC released a press statement strongly supporting the bill and encouraging its swift passage.

The bill was co-sponsored by the three other APEC Caucus co-chairs, Representatives Joe Crowley (D-NY), Kevin Brady (R-TX) and Wally Herger (R-CA).

H.R. 3192 is an important step that, if passed, clears the final administrative



hurdle to allowing U.S. citizens to enjoy the benefits of the ABTC program, including expedited processing at international ports of entry via special ABTC immigration lanes.

NCAPEC will continue to monitor progress of this bill and subsequent implementation of the program, including development of eligibility criteria and issuance guidance. We welcome input from companies regarding their priorities and concerns for this program. A copy of the NCAPEC press release is available from the Center.
