NCAPEC is also working with Monument to build broad Congressional support. The Center is currently working with a bipartisan group of four Members interested in starting a House APEC Caucus. A formal announcement is expected in November and a launch in early 2009. NCAPEC plans to work with this group to help communicate to Congress APEC's opportunities and importance.

Finally, NCAPEC has met with representatives of both Senator McCain and Senator Obama to encourage a strong commitment to APEC and a robust agenda for 2011. We will work with the new Administration's transition team to push a strong APEC agenda – and ensure that we "hit the ground running" in 2009.

#### Singapore Sets 2009 Agenda

In anticipation of its hosting of APEC 2009, Singapore in October conducted a two-day Symposium to develop key themes and solicit input from both public and private sectors of APEC economies. Attendees included government, business and academic experts from across the region, including ABAC members and representatives.

The agenda laid out by Singapore centers on a theme of a 'connected region' building a 'stronger APEC'. Focus of efforts will be in three main areas: regional economic integration (described as 'at the border'); improving the business environment (trade facilitation, 'behind the border'); and enhancing connectivity (infrastructure, characterized as 'across the border'). 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#### ABAC Statement on Financial Crisis

Since the ABAC meeting in Hangzhou last August, the U.S. economy has suffered bank failures, government takeovers of financial intermediaries, frozen credit markets, and vast losses in the equities markets. The crisis has spread globally and efforts have been and are continuing to be made to stabilize markets. Immediately after the U.S. Congress passed the Emergency Economic Stabilization Act, ABAC Chair Juan Raffo requested U.S. ABAC member Michael Phillips to draft a letter to Finance Ministers and Leaders that recommended regulatory policies which would help reinforce the region's capital markets.

This letter from the ABAC Chair echoes similar recommendations made in greater detail to Finance Ministers written back in Mr. Phillips recommended that Leaders, Finance Ministers and central bankers collaborate to take steps incrementally, using existing securities and market surveillance and enforcement mechanisms to reestablish confidence in financial markets by investors.

APEC Finance Ministers will meet in Truiillo, Peru on November 5 and 6 to discuss the global financial crisis and continued efforts to develop capital markets in the region. ABAC will engage with Ministers to help identify the necessary changes to regulatory and institutional frameworks which will help restore confidence in financial markets.

REI - Expect an increased focus on exploring regional trade liberalization mechanisms, including FTAAP as a long term prospect. Given Singapore's hosting, the fact that 3 ABAC meetings will be in P4-member countries, and the recent announcement of U.S. participation in expanded P4 negotiations (including redesignation of the P4 agreement as a 'Trans Pacific Partnership' or TPP agreement), expect a renewed emphasis on the TPP as 'one possible example' of a potential future Asia-Pacific REI solution.

Trade Facilitation - Emphasis on structural and regulatory reform as a means of addressing 'behind the border' issues will continue to be the main focus of APEC's trade facilitation efforts. There is general consensus that this area is well suited to APEC, of immediate concern to business, and has the potential to provide substantial measurable benefits to all APEC econo-

**Connectivity** – Singapore's emphasis is on physical connectivity, to enhance sup-Based on these discussions, from our pre- ply chains and linkages between economies. Much business input during the disconnectivity, including IT, MRAs, standards, and other areas more amenable to being addressed in a multilateral APECstyle forum. Expect a bit of both, with an emphasis on a 'best practices' approach as well as an effort to promote public-private partnerships to enhance connectivity in developing economies.

> In all these areas, it is very clear that under Singapore's leadership both the governments and the ABAC will be actively seeking input from the private sector, especially in identifying impediments to business. The National Center is confident that next year will provide a wide range of opportunities for companies throughout the U.S. private sector to participate actively in informing, shaping and driving the APEC agenda to advance U.S. business and policy interests in the region.

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
